## St Joseph's Catholic Primary School

Throughout the academic year, we support a number of charities at St Joseph's. During Harvest, we work closely with The London and Slough Charitable Trust. We are always so amazed with the donations families send. Our children join the volunteers at the church to prepare the food into parcels - it reminds them how important it is to think of others. # St Michael's Catholic School

High Wycombe – Primary and Secondary



In this Year of Prayer, we have striven for greater range and opportunity for prayer, and also focussed weekly on the 'St. Michael Virtues' (Stewardship, Truthful, Merciful, Inspirational, Courageous, Humility, Aspirational, Empathetic and Loving) as well as the principles of Catholic Social Teaching. # St Peter's Catholic Primary School

Members of Year 5 and Year 6 were invited to apply to be members of the School's Mission Team, with a remit of helping spread the school's Mission Statement 'Live and Learn as Friends of Jesus' and help strengthen links with the local parish of St. Peter's. This involved applying for the position through a formal letter, outlining how they would help achieve the above. They were then interviewed by a member of STCAT's Central Team. The successful applicants attended the Education Mass to be commissioned by Bishop David. Once officially part of the team, members worked together to draw up a list of priorities and goals that aligned with the mission of St. Peter's.

Their first task was running a card competition; to design cards for those who were sick, socially isolated, or celebrating a baptism within the school and parish community. They were then responsible for making the chosen cards and ensuring they were given to the appropriate people. Additionally, they published a termly newsletter to parents. This informed parents of their priorities, work covered in RE, and an explanation of various events in the liturgical calendar. During the Advent Term, they helped with the organisation of the Harvest Appeal for the local Food Bank and our annual Christmas Fair. During the Lent Term, they played an important role in organising and participating in our Golden Jubilee celebrations.

In addition, they organised and led school assemblies, prepared the Hall for assembly, and helped with displays that promoted the virtues covered by the 'Virtues to Live By' programme. They also coordinated the weekly attendance draws and nominations for individuals who exemplify the virtues being covered.



The Mission Team has made a meaningful difference in the lives of those both in school and the parish while also growing personally and spiritually. Through their commitment to their role, the Mission Team exemplified the values of compassion, empathy, and unity that are essential for Living and Learning as Friends of Jesus.
