continents	Continents are the large landmasses on Earth that contain all the smaller countries
elephant	The largest living land animals
penguin	flightless, aquatic birds
shark	Sharks are large fish that have a skeleton made of cartilage
swallows	a small bird with long, pointed wings and often a forked tail
Africa	the world's second largest continent (after Asia)
South America	the fourth largest continent
North Americas	the third largest of the continents
Oceania	Thousands of islands scattered across the Pacific Ocean, grouped together
Europe	Europe is the second smallest of the world's seven continents

Geographers go on journeys to cities, countries and **continents**. Many animals do too! The continents' names are: Asia, Oceania, Europe, Antarctica, North America and South America. Around each continent are seas and oceans. These are the Arctic, Southern, Pacific, Atlantic and Indian.

African elephants eat plants, can live a long time and are the largest land animal.

Small **sharks** live in the sea around the UK. Even whale sharks, which are the size of a bus and live around Australia in Oceania, are harmless to us.

Birds called **swallows** fly across the world. They fly over land, eating and drinking as they go, often not stopping until they reach the south of Africa.

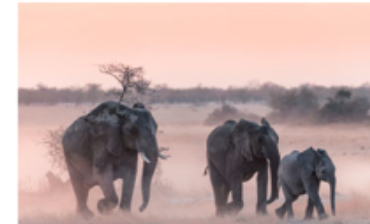
